

Letter from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,

I can still picture the scene in my mind's eye. I was in my first year of training to be a minister. I was having significant back problems and was preaching that Sunday morning in a church in the Warrington Circuit. I knew it was not a very good sermon, but it was the best I had managed to write in the circumstances of essays, placements etc. To cap it all my tutor turned up to assess my service! GREAT!!!

Two days later the inevitable feedback came. I recall one sentence in particular. "Well Janet, that wasn't a good service, but you got away with it, as you are a good communicator!" Back handed compliment or what?!

Now do not get me wrong, I am certainly not saying communication trumps content, but it is worthwhile considering, that even if you have the most amazing information, the most astounding content, if it is not communicated well...

Our eldest son works in communication and is often heard saying "It's all down to coms mam, its all down to coms!"

What enables a Circuit to work well as a Circuit, is good communication, something which can always be improved. This may hopefully result in you bumping into someone from around the Circuit, saying "I didn't get to... but how did it go, or that Strawberry tea at your church was wonderful, I am so pleased I was able to go to ..." each affirming our connectedness with one another, and reinforcing the mission of us all to share the love of Jesus wherever we are placed.

May we all try our best to work together as a Circuit, for the glory of God and God's the Kingdom, sharing God's Good News, our news, with all.

PEN PORTRAIT FROM REVD. DR STEPHEN LINDRIDGE



What a difference a year makes! After 30 years in ministry, it felt like I'd served something more like 50! I was ready to retire. However, by God's grace the space gifted me by the Methodist Church of this past year, has renewed my heart and head. It has given me fresh energy and restored my love for people. So I am delighted to be joining the South West Tyneside Circuit at SRMC, the church on two sites, Chopwell and Rowlands Gill.

As a pen portrait, that's a little of where I've come from and where I am now. So to a little of who am I. I was born in London, and my first brief home was in the grounds of Chester House, the Methodist Association of Youth Clubs Centre in Muswell Hill, where both my parents worked. We moved to Hull within months of my birth and for the next 22 years I developed a soft Yorkshire accent.

Elaine and I met at Cliff Bridal, sorry Bible College, and offered as a candidate for ministry in my 2nd year at Cliff. Before going to train in Durham, for ministry, Elaine and I got married in Birtley in 1991. Ironically three years later we were stationed just over 1 mile from Birtley, to serve Wrekenton, Springwell and Eighton Banks. During those next fifteen years we saw the beautiful additions of Ruth and Samuel, and the building of the Angel of the North. Ruth as a toddler always referred to it as "Daddy's Angel" because I and it were so big, in her eyes.

Having job shared for eight of these years while the children were little, Elaine and I then went full-time when I started to serve the District as Evangelism Enabler. This was a fantastic role, encouraging ordinary folk to find confidence in sharing who and what they were in Jesus with those around them in their neighbourhoods. These were the years when we realised the church was in significant decline and woke up to the fact that, things could not be business as usual. It was a time of lots of new initiatives, projects and prayer.

These new insights of meeting people who didn't come to church out were they were, became know as the national and international initiative of fresh expressions. I became the Archbishops and Connexional Missioner in 2009 and travelled all over the British Isles and internationally encouraging people from all walks of life to consider how they might, think and practice forming church in new ways that would connect with people who might never attend church as they traditionally had. We saw the number of initiatives multiply exponentially and from independent research it was deemed the most successful evangelist exercise the denominations had invested in. Out of every five people in a fresh expression the research showed two people had had no previous church background and were on the journey in finding faith in Jesus.

In 2014 the whisper of the Holy Spirit stirred me again as Red Leo Osborn announced he was stepping down as Chair of District. It had been yet again a great Synod and I found myself uttering under my breath what a privilege it would be to serve such a great bunch of people. So reluctantly but faithfully I let my name go forward.

The role of Chair of District is relentless, but I recognized in the first few weeks of that role, God's call and equipping. There are many things I encountered in serving the Connexion and District that were deeply wonderful and life giving. It was a huge privilege to be part of that. However, there were parts that I hope others never experience. So, after nine years it was time to rest and refocus, and to hand on the baton.

Within weeks of relinquishing the role, friends and family said they could see a real difference in me. Now my sense of joy in the world is bright, life is full and rich. God's love and peace are brimming. I have loved doing the simple things of life which previously were nonexistent or a bind. Fixing things round the house, clearing out unwanted stuff.

My most significant blessing has been able to be present for family in times of need. This last year has been tough with all our parents suffering significant health issues, often at the same time. Most prominently, in the death my mother-in-law Irene, which has understandably changed our family dynamic and to which we are still adjusting.

The rhythms of the Camino, (a walk to Santiago de Compostela, The Way of St James), which I did in October last year, have stayed with me. You get up, you walk, you eat, you meet people on The Way, you talk, you sleep, and repeat. This is for me a rich blessing and one I'm still practicing.

SYNOD REPORT 13TH SEPTEMBER 2025 WESTERHOPE METHODIST CHURCH

Synod began promptly at 10 am with worship and the communion service. Rev Stuart Earle led the service, and drawing on his knowledge let us know that the meaning of the word Synod was in fact Shared Journey. Rev Jona Sewell spoke about, our connections, Structural, through church, circuit, districts, regions and on to the Connexion that we know. But also, about our connectedness in God, how, like the body we are connected in Romans and Corinthians but that the connections we have are with God and with love.

Following a short break, we moved into the business of Synod and a view of the District Mission plan (see right).

In the first sheet of rows and columns it demonstrates what the methodist church is called to be. You can see that the first row outlines the growing inclusive evangelistic and justice seeking church. The last row is indicative of some of the things that the district staff team and officers are able to offer and resource.

Then, in order to fulfil the connections, we have the discussions with the district team can be fruitful.

Questions were invited by Jona and more people than I have ever seen came forward with questions and comments. This led into the Shieldfield Project and involved a conversation between Rev. Following this, we heard from Fiona Dowson, from MHA, she talked to us about work with the elderly and referred to the new prayer handbook, Our story, Our song. Fiona talked about the importance of story and how we need to tell stories and give opportunities to allow others to tell theirs.

Synod broke for lunch and was followed by video from conference. The conference took place in Telford and as well as the induction of the President and Vice President, there were for me several familiar faces, not least Deacon Natalie Clark who you will know, who was ordained this year.

Much of the rest of the afternoon involved matters from conference:

A budget deficit, The re-invitation of the Rev Jonathan Hustler, Word from MHA addressing the increase in the care they provide and its improvement to reach pre pandemic levels, An encouraging word to think about MHA Sunday, A revision of the Methodist Worship book both digital and printed to make it more inclusive, the intention to have this work completed by 2030, A discussion on Support for Military Chaplains, Discussion on Healing Ministry, Praying and Prayed for, better resources to improve inclusivity, Stationing review which was received and referred for further work, Hope in Gods future, a discussion concerning Theology and Science, Justice priorities in particular Refugees and Asylum seekers. How would this look in your church, Israel and Palestine, Election of Reps to Conference was agreed, Vacancies and newly filled roles, Succession planning, Stuart Earle reinvitation for a further three years.

Reports that Chester le Street and East Durham will merge and become Hope Circuit, PFE report and a new district Treasurer, EPC ratings on Manses which need to be C or above, Apologies from Cathy Bevan video Our church's future story, Mother House report, Recovery Church development where deacon Tracey Hume spoke and an appeal for individuals to help support financially.
