Thinking Finance? NEfirst Credit Union

NEFirst Credit Union formed by the merger of smaller North East based Credit Unions who have been providing savings and loan accounts for their members for more than twenty years.

NEFirst Credit Union covers the whole of the North East, Credit unions typically offer lower fees, higher including County Durham, Northumberland and all of the boroughs that make up Tyne and Wear. Anyone who lives or works in this area is eligible to join.

Letter from the Superintendent

Every seven years the Methodist Church gives its ministers a three month Sabbatical; time for re-equipping, refreshment and renewal. This time around I planned to continue to get to know the local context, as life has been so restricted due to Covid-19 since my arrival in September 2020. In preparation document I wrote: 'I believe my calling to the Southwest Tyneside Circuit is to encourage and facilitate fresh approaches to mission. Key to this will be a good understanding of the local context and the mission that has been undertaken to date ... The Sabbatical will give me time to reflect on what I have discovered [so far] and get to know people and organisations within the area that at present do not connect with the church.'

Back in November 2020, in preparation for a Circuit Leadership Team Away Day, I had come across the Indices of Multiple Deprivation on the Gateshead Council and County Durham websites. I was struck by the level of need, represented by the red or dark orange on the map in certain parts of our circuit, whilst other areas were much more affluent. Now in the summer of 2022 I intended to get beneath the statistics and discover more.

I wonder how you begin to get to know a new place, if you have moved to a new area or go on holiday to a different destination. I decided to walk around the area, taking the bus to different parts of the circuit, and talk to people who know Gateshead from a different perspective. There will be opportunity to tell you more when we meet but in this letter I want to share a little of conversations with people I had met.

In May I arranged to meet with Natalie Goodman, the deputy lead for the Public Health Department of Gateshead Council. Natalie explained that the overall aim of the Public Health Department is to work for improvement in health but this is a long game as the emphasis is on encouraging lifestyle change. She told me that the greatest concern in terms of public health is the poverty and deprivation within the borough which is getting worse. The Council is seeking to address this by careful allocation of the Prosperity money, funds allocated by central government as part of the levelling up agenda. This summer funds were being offered to community groups to provide Warm Spaces for those who are unable to heat their own homes. A month later I met with Michael Walker, the Poverty Lead for Gateshead Council.

I asked Michael about the scope of his role, and he responded by saying it was a mix of policy, partnership and influencing. He added "one person cannot solve the problems. Poverty will only be solved by fundamental change at various levels including central government." He spoke of the good collaboration that takes place between various sectors in Gateshead already, and the potential for more working together. His priority back in June was ensuring the council played its part in addressing the impact of the soaring energy prices and the food poverty that is impacting so many people.

Letter from the Superintendent Continued

My first visit in July was to meet Liz Twist MP in her constituency office in Blaydon. Her concerns were the impact of the rising bills for energy, the increasing cost of food, and the limited increases in wages being offered to public sector workers. Liz also spoke about the cooperation and goodwill between various organisations, charities and the council within the constituency.

During the course of my Sabbatical I have taken time to reflect on what God is saying in this current context, and concluded that our role is to feed the hungry and provide shelter for the vulnerable (See Matthew 25: 34 - 36) as we 'Share the love of Jesus: in this time; in this place'. I was delighted on my return to regular duties to discover that several churches had signed up for the Warm Spaces scheme, but this is just the beginning. Over the coming months I pray that we will engage in meaningful conversations with our neighbours, gain an understanding of the problems that people in our area are encountering, and work with other agencies to offer help to the needy. As the Methodist Church in this area we have much to offer: twelve buildings across the Southwest Tyneside area; more than five hundred members with unique gifts and talents; and the empowering of the Holy Spirit to enable us to reach out with the compassion of Christ.
